List all the things you would do to prepare for Jesus' coming and during his stay. Below are a few starter ideas:


"I will clean my room and make my bed every day."

"I will not be grouchy or stubborn when asked to do something."


"I will be better behaved at the dinner table."

"I will pay attention during family prayer time."


When all have finished their lists, hang them where they can be read and followed every day as a reminder that Jesus has already come and stays with us constantly.

We need to understand exactly what it means to say yes to Jesus. We can learn this when we pray together, when we read the gospel stories together,


when we talk about ways to love and care for others, and when we apologize to those we have hurt. We can learn from one another.



In today's gospel story Jesus invites the apostles to follow him.


Jesus had stories to share with them, stories about God and love and how to live a good life; stories they really wanted to hear.

Your children know, of course, that you are here to take care of their needs and their safety. But they need to feel God's love and the presence of divine protection when they are alone.


Introduce them to their own personal guardian angels. Explain that God has assigned a special angel to each and every one of us. Let them know that their angel cares about them because God cares about them.




Gospel Crossword




nice that somebody in your family has done for you this week. Write them a special thank you note and give it to them.

Write a note to your secret friend telling him or her about the qualities or talents he or she has that you really like. Don't sign the note!


Leave small gifts on your friend's pillow in the morning (prayer cards, medals, something you made yourself...). Don't get caught!
